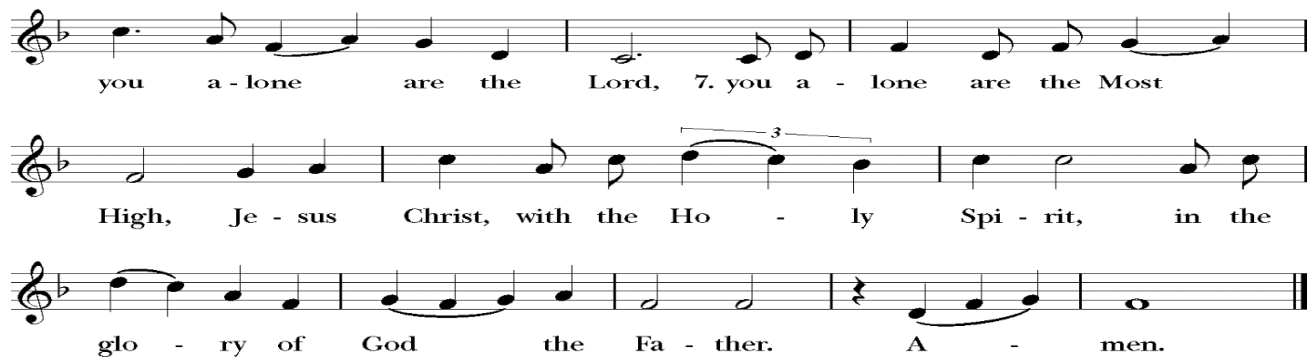

A reading from the Book of Exodus (Exodus 17:1-7).

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the LORD commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarreled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the LORD?" But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" So Moses cried out to the LORD, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." The LORD said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. He called the place Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarreled and tested the LORD, saying, "Is the LORD among us or not?"

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,

who, though he was in the form of God,

but emptied himself,
taking the form of a slave,
being born in human likeness.

And being found in human form,
he humbled himself
and became obedient to the point of death--
even death on a cross.

Therefore God also highly exalted him

When Jesus entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" Jesus said to them, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?" And they argued with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why then did you not believe him?' But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we are afraid of the crowd; for all regard John as a prophet." So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things. "What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went. The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir'; but he did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him."

The Sermon

A brief time of reflection follows the sermon

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken

through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Celebrant continues

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have

delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with Mary, Luke, Euphrosyne, Paul and Eustochium, Jerome, Therese, Remigius, John Raleigh, and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your children; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

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From the Calendar of Saints

September 27 Euphrosyne/Smaragdus of Alexandria *Monastic, fifth century*

As a young woman, Euphrosyne and her father quarreled after she refused to marry. She ran away, cut her hair, changed her clothing for men's attire, and adopted the name of Smaragdus. He entered a monastic community wherein he was ironically called upon to counsel his father who came to the monastery grieving the loss of his daughter.

It was only as Smaragdus was ill and near to death that the father's eyes were finally opened, and he recognized that the beloved daughter he had mourned as dead and the monk who had guided him through his grief were in fact the same person. He nursed Smaragdus lovingly during his final illness, and then became a monk himself.

September 28 Paul and Eustochium of Rome *Monastics and Scholars, 404 and c. 419*

Fluent in Greek, Paula and her daughter Eustochium were ardent students of the scriptures and they quickly mastered Hebrew under the scholar Jerome's tutelage. When Jerome went East, Paula and Eustochium followed him, making a pilgrimage of the Holy Land. The three of them settled in Bethlehem and there Paula had four monasteries erected—one for men, over which Jerome presided, and three for women. After the death of her mother, Eustochium assumed direction of the monasteries.

September 29 Saint Michael and All Angels

Of the many angels in the Bible, only four are called by name: Michael, Gabriel, Uriel, and Raphael. The Archangel Michael wards off evil as God's powerful agent and delivers peace to God's people at the end of life's mortal struggle.

September 30 Jerome *Priest, and Monk of Bethlehem, 420*

The foremost biblical scholar of the ancient church, Jerome translated the Bible from classical Greek into "vulgar" Latin, a work that became known as the Vulgate. He was a difficult person, seldom pleasant but never dull.

October 1 Therese of Lisieux *Monastic, 1897*

From an early age, Therese felt called to the religious life. At fourteen she, "understood her vocation to be prayer for priests, and she began seeking admittance to the Carmelite convent in Lisieux. She led a life of prayer and acts of charity. At 24, she wrote her memoir *Story of a Soul*. Closer to her death at age 26, she experienced a profound sense of abandonment by God, but even this did not shake her love for God. She said that her vocation was to be "love in the heart of the church." Her last words were, "My God, I love you."

October 2 Remigius *Bishop of Rheims, 530*

A patron saint of France, Remigius converted and baptized King Clovis of the Franks, an event that changed Europe's religious history. His charge to the king was, "Worship what you have burned, and burn what you have worshiped."

October 3 John Raleigh Mott *Ecumenist and Missionary, 1955*

Living a life advocating for ecumenism, Mott received the Nobel Peace Prize for his work in establishing and strengthening international organizations which worked for peace. The World Council of Churches, the founding of which was largely driven by Mott's efforts, elected him its life-long Honorary President in 1948. Though Methodist, the Episcopal Church made him an honorary canon of the National Cathedral.
